

## Welcome to worship at Saint Gabriel's Episcopal Parish.

Here for the first time? We're glad you have joined us! You're welcome here just as you are.

## Worship

Worship in the Episcopal Church is traditional, and draws from both contemporary and ancient sources, and usually consists of a couple of books and a bulletin. The red book in front of you is the *Book of Common Prayer*, a central text of our Communion, and is rich with prayers and spiritual resources that shape our common life as Episcopalians/Anglicans.

The blue book is our *Hymnal*, where most of our hymns (songs) come from. The "S" numbers, or the pieces of service music listed in the bulletin (Gloria, Sanctus, Agnus Dei), are found at the beginning of the hymnal. Hymns are numbered and easy to locate.

Both books are usually used. If you get confused, don't worry, you'll get the hang of it!

## Nursery Care and Youth Formation

Nursery care is available free of charge for all children under age 3. The nursery is located in the building across from the courtyard. Youth Formation (Church School) is also located across the courtyard and is available for all children and youth ages 3 and up. An Usher can help you and your family locate both spaces.

Land Acknowledgement Saint Gabriel's Church rests on the ancestral homeland of the Wampanoag people, that once stretched from the tip of Cape Cod westward into Narragansett Bay. The Wampanoag, or "People of the First Light", inhabited and cared for these lands for over 12,000 years prior to the arrival of Europeans. The Sippican lands (now known as Marion), as well as some of the surrounding areas, were taken as a "right of conquest" after King Philip's War in the 1670s. Today, members of the Wampanoag community are still in our midst and include two federally recognized tribes: the Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe and the Wampanoag Tribe of Gay Head (Aquinnah). We are grateful to be able to worship on this beautiful land and understand that this acknowledgment is just a first step towards honoring the Wampanoag people and recognizing the violence and hardships they have endured. Saint Gabriel's Church commits to regular, meaningful financial support and allyship for organizations that lift up and celebrate the Wampanoag community.

### THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

#### Please be seated

#### The First Lesson

Acts 8:26-40

An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this:

"Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth."

The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good

news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

#### The Epistle

I John 4:7-21

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.


By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

#### The Gospel

John 15:1-8

Jesus said to his disciples, "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinegrower. He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit. You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you. Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing. Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples."

#### The Sermon

Silence for Reflection (a minute of silence is held)

The Nicene Creed Please stand

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Have compassion on all Christians who suffer persecution; those affected by war, disaster, and tragedy throughout the world; all those who suffer from any grief or trouble; and those for whom our prayers are requested; **That they may be delivered from their distress.** 

We now pray for any particular people either silently or aloud. Silence is kept as people pray for individuals aloud or silently.

Give to the departed eternal rest; Let light perpetual shine upon them.

We remember Louis Coffin Sr., Jean Dunnington Cullen, Daniel Drusdow and Eleanor Duursema Drusdow in whose memory the altar flowers are given by Danielle and Louis Coffin. We praise you for your saints who have entered into joy;

May we also come to share in your heavenly kingdom.

Let us pray for our own needs and those of others. In the silence the people may add their own prayers of intercession or thanksgiving.

The Collect at the Prayers The Celebrant adds a concluding collect.

#### **Confession of Sin**

All: Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

#### Absolution

*Celebrant:* Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. Amen.



#### The Anamnesis

*Celebrant* We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new.

And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all.

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#### The Words of Institution

When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." +

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." **+** 

#### The Memorial Acclamation

*Celebrant* Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

All We praise you, we bless you, we give thanks to you, and we pray to you, Lord our God.

Lord, we pray that in your goodness and mercy your Holy Spirit may descend upon us, and upon these gifts, sanctifying them and showing them to be holy gifts for your holy people, the bread of life and the cup of salvation, the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ.

Grant that all who share this bread and cup may become one body and one spirit, a living sacrifice in Christ, to the praise of your Name.

Remember all clergy who minister in your Church. Remember all your people, and those who seek your truth. Remember the Shrine Church of Our Lady of Walsingham, And all the parishes of our Diocese.

Remember all who have died in the peace of Christ, and those whose faith is known to you alone; bring them into the place of eternal joy and light.



#### The Prayer of Humble Access

#### **Invitation to Communion**

*Celebrant:* Behold the Lamb of God. Behold him who takes away the sins of the world. +

People: Lord, I am not worthy that you should come under my roof, but speak the word only and my soul shall be healed.

ALL baptized persons, regardless of denomination, are welcome to receive Holy Communion. If you need gluten-free bread, please cross your palms upside down. You may drink from the common cup at the rail. A cup for intinction (dipping of bread) is located outside the rail. Please cross your hands over your chest if you would like to only receive a blessing.
